C2C Invites BUF to Join with Them in New Statewide Climate Justice Initiative

Community to Community, BUF's Partner Organization, has been a core planning team member of the coming state-wide ballot initiative on equitable climate justice. C2C, as a rep for Front And Centered, will continue to be involved with the Oversight Board once (if) the ballot initiative passes. Front And Centered is a coalition of 60+ organizations representing people of color in Washington State (http://frontandcentered.org/). The group working on this initiative (Alliance for Jobs and

Clean Energy) includes: tribes, health organizations, Front And Centered, big environmental organizations, labor groups, utilities, government representatives and businesses. The ballot initiative is expected to be submitted by the end of this month. Its main focus is on 1) setting a truly emission-reducing carbon fee structure, and 2) directing a percentage of the resources it generates toward groups and communities most heavily impacted by emissions, climate change and displacement; as well as investing in clean green jobs and initiatives.




